“The Management of Equine Joint Disease”

Any of you who have an ‘Oldie’ or indeed any horse that is athletic or arthritic will certainly be interested in this talk about joint disease, its treatment and prevention. Recent research conducted solely on veteran horses showed that they all showed signs of improvement in joint mobility and movement over a 12 week period when given an oral chondroprotective supplement (in this case Synoquin) whether or not they had a diagnosed joint disease. A chondroprotective supplement is a combination of glucosamine hydrochloride and chondroitin sulphate. Not only that, it also showed this type of supplement to be potentially useful as a preventative against later lameness caused by joint degeneration. Anyone who has a horse approaching older age, or a horse that works hard, be it eventing, showing or long distance, should attend this talk. It will cover joint conditions and diseases, how these supplements work, Synoquin and other products in the market place – and anything else you wish to ask!
